A Letter from Pr. Dana.....

Friend in Christ,

Looking Ahead at the Book Group

Immanuel's book group is meeting throughout the winter with meetings on Monday evenings and Thursday morning. Reader's choice as which day and time to attend, we're reading the same book at both meeting dates.

In January we're reading a non-fiction book Sisters of Sinai: How Two Lady Adventurers Discovered Hidden Gospels by Janice Soskice. It's the true story of two Victorian Women who traveled to St. Catherine's Monastery in the Sinai Peninsulas and discovered the earliest known copy of the Gospels in ancient Syriac, the language Jesus spoke.

In February we are meeting to discuss Isadore's Secret: Sin, Murder and Confession in a Northern Michigan Town by Mardi Link. This is a real page turner. It's a true crime novel set in Northern Michigan in the town of Isadore which is in Leelanau County. Isadore was a small farming community with a traditional Catholic and Polish speaking population. In 1907 a nun disappeared from the Holy Rosary Convent. A full-scale search took place with hundreds of men and women searching the woods, farms, swamps and ponds. A bloodhound tried to find her scent, a clairvoyant couldn't find a trace of her, the mother house in Detroit didn't hear from her. It was a national mystery...and then a national scandal!

In March, we're reading a novel that is also set in Northern Michigan. It's The Recipe Box by Viola Shipman. It's a feel-good novel and a sweet romance, filled with good recipes. It follows several generations of women who live, love and work to save the family orchards. It's a vivid picture of life in Northern Michigan.

Contributing Stocks or Bonds

To contribute capital gain property such as stocks or bonds to the church, per IRS Publication 526 you can deduct the Fair Market Value of the asset on your personal tax returns - not the basis in the asset. Immanuel has a brokerage account to facilitate the transfer of these assets directly. If you are interested, please contact the church for information or assistance.

Tax Break for contributions – people over 70 1/2 years-old

If you are over 70.5 did you know that you can give directly from your retirement account to Immanuel Lutheran Church and no pay taxes on the gift? Due to the tax changes that include a higher standard deduction and the elimination of the personal exemption it is possible the best tax benefit for contributions to the church is to give directly from your retirement account.
